Bring: 4 - 2.5 inch x WOF strips either one colour or mixed Halloween themed strips of purple, orange, green and black; 2 Halloween themed fat quarters; 4 -10 inch squares Halloween themed.

Maybe don a Halloween costume or sport a homemade Halloween themed sewing item at your sewing table, or make Halloween treats for the snack table. Prizes will be awarded!



#### \*\*\* A Note from the Treasurer by Anita Reimer

Just a quick note to all members regarding our square and fees.

As you may have noticed on our proposed Balanced Budget, we are not going to pay the square fee for the use of a credit card. That cost will be passed to the purchaser rather than the whole guild. That charge is only 5% of the purchase. For example if you used your credit card for a \$5 workshop, you will be charged \$5.25. If credit card is used to pay for retreat the charge will be \$315. Otherwise charge will be \$300. There are no extra charges if you pay by cheque, cash or Interac, or an e-transfer. You will see this charge on the machine when you are giving authorization for the purchase. This will also assist you in case you gave the wrong card at time of purchase.

So there is going to be a 5% charge added to your purchase <u>only</u> when using your credit card. There will be NO additional charges for any cash, cheque, Interac or e-transfer to the guild.

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### Caring by Angie Wood


Hello everyone:


6 Ways Sewing Can Positively Impact Your Mental Health

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## Lorraine Johnson-Brotsky Scholarship

Well-known and beloved art quilter and wearable art designer and maker Lorraine Johnson-Brotsky died In October 2022. She had won multiple awards for her wearable art at CQA over the years. She was a founder of the wearable art group, The Wowsers, and a member of QuArtz.

After her death, her husband, Dave Brotsky, asked a group of her friends from Quartz for ideas on what to do with her many wearable art clothes. Dave brainstormed with the group and was delighted when they hit on the idea of a fundraiser to a scholarship in her memory. The main criteria for the scholarship would be awarded to students pursing studies in clothing, textiles and fashion design and sewing – career fields that reflect Lorraine's interest, experiences or education. Then the Wowser group, headed by Lorraine's good friend Mary Matus organized for a fundraiser, called "Lorraine's Treasures" to sell Lorraine's many original designer jackets, hats, scarves and vests. The group cataloged, photographed, and valued the items and offered them for sale or donation.

The Sale/Donation event was held April 29th at Trinity United Church. Proceeds from the Sales and Donations Totaled \$ 8665.00. Subsequent to the date, others have come to Dave's house and purchased further items for a further \$1255.00 now totaling \$ 9920.00. Funds have been deposited at Fraser Financial July 10, 2023. This sum of money could provide several \$ 1000.00 or more scholarships for years to come! Another sales event of remaining items will be held at a later date. There are about 20 clothing items remaining and a few accessories.

The "Wearable Art" garments are gone. Additionally, new homes are needed for Lorraine's sewing machines and large collections of fabrics, notions, supplies etc. If you know of someone (child, grandchild, friend of a friend) who has a career interest in textile, be sure to let them know of this scholarship. You can still donate personally to the scholarship fund.

Honey Whole Wheat Banana Bread 3 small bananas 3/4 cup honey 1/4 cup melted butter 2 beaten eggs 1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour 1 tsp baking soda 1/2 tsp salt Mash bananas.
